The Bible is essential to growth in the Christian life. God has written a book and given it to the world. What a glorious thought! That we can have the very Word of God in our hands should be both thrilling and humbling. The psalmist declares the Word as "more to be desired than gold, even much fine gold" and "sweeter also than honey and drippings of the honeycomb" (Ps. 19:10). More valuable than money and sweeter than honey is the Bible to the believer.

It is also sharper than any two-edged sword and pierces to the division of soul and spirit, of joint and of marrow, discerning the thoughts and intentions of the heart (Heb. 4:12). It cuts us and brings healing. It is the sword of the Spirit that is given for defense against the devil (Eph. 6:17), with our Lord Jesus Christ using it in His battle against the temptation of Satan.





A Christian cannot be without the Bible if he or she is to continue to grow. However, we will not always have it with us. Even with the rise of technology, there will be moments of need in which the Bible is out of the hand's grasp. When temptations arise, we must be ready. We must prioritize Bible memorization. Scripture memorized can be recalled, meditated upon, delighted in, and used in conversations when your Bible is still on your bedside table. Bible memorization, though, can be intimidating.

I have stored up your word in my heart, that I might not sin against you.

Psalm 119:11

How can we protect ourselves from temptations becoming sin? By storing up the Word of God in our heart. When temptations arise, we must be ready to fight with Scripture. If we are not prepared, it will be too late when sin knocks at the door. We must fight sin with the Word.

Fear not, for I am with you; be not dismayed, for I am your God; I will strengthen you, I will help you, I will uphold you with my righteous right hand.

Why should we not fear when difficulties arrive? It is because God is with us. In Christ, through the Holy Spirit, God is with us, strengthens us, helps us, and upholds us. It is not our own effort, but His power that will see us through.



For the Lord God is a sun and shield; the Lord bestows favor and honor. No good thing does he withhold from those who walk uprightly.

Psalm 84:11

Sin in general, and lust in particular, holds out the promise of pleasure. How we combat this is by believing that God will not withhold anything good from us. No pleasure is withheld from believers. Do you really believe that the holiness the Lord has called you to is more desirable than the pleasure of sin promised? God does not withhold any good from those who walk uprightly.



He who did not spare his own Son but gave him up for us all, how will he not also with him graciously give us all things?

Romans 8:32

This verse displays the beautiful logic of salvation. If God did not spare His Son, why then would He withhold any other good? God has already given us what is most valuable in all of the universe, so we can trust that He will not be stingy in any other areas.

Therefore do not be anxious, saying, "What shall we eat?" or "What shall we wear?"
For the Gentiles seek after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them all. But seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be added to you.
